Improvingthe health of our communities

Our work is informed continually by a comprehensive assessment of community health needs, and our grantmaking focuses on making the greatest impact. We're proud to support local nonprofits and community partners meeting the critical health needs of underserved populations. Together, we're creating healthier and more equitable communities.

In 2022, Kaiser Permanente provided nearly \$3.7 million in charitable contributions to address community health priorities in our East Bay service area. Read on for examples of our work.

Supporting community mental health

Amid a national mental health professional shortage, we invested in expanding a diverse, well-trained, culturally responsive mental health workforce. We also focused on increasing access to mental health services for low-income and vulnerable populations.

One example of this is our support of YES Nature to Neighborhoods to address a scarcity of mental health services in Richmond, California. Our grant helped YES integrate culturally relevant outdoor recreation programs for underrepresented youth and adults while providing mental health, trauma-informed case management, and social-emotional skills workshops and services.

Strengthening the health care safety net

We partnered with safety-net hospitals and community health centers to improve care quality for low-income, Medi-Cal, and uninsured patients. Kaiser Permanente clinicians also donated their time and expertise to support these patients.

Our grant to Native American Health Center helped this longtime community clinic provide comprehensive, culturally informed services to improve the health and well-being of American Indians and residents of surrounding communities. Our funding also helped the center enhance its electronic medical records system.

Supporting economic opportunities to change lives

Financial health is fundamental to people's ability to maintain overall health. We supported organizations that work with underserved populations to promote college and career readiness, quality jobs, and diverse small business growth.

One example is our support of Rising Sun Center for Opportunity's construction training program called Opportunity Build. Our grant helped East Bay jobseekers launch family-sustaining union careers in the construction trades. Rising Sun has trained more than 2,000 youth and 1,000 adults, with a focus on low-income individuals overcoming barriers to employment.
