# Kaiser Permanente Golden Gate 2022 Community Health Snapshot

Serving communities around our San Francisco and San Rafael medical facilities.



## **Improving**the health of our communities

Our work is informed continually by a comprehensive assessment of community health needs, and our grantmaking focuses on making the greatest impact. We're proud to support local nonprofits and community partners meeting the critical health needs of underserved populations. Together, we're creating healthier and more equitable communities.

In 2022, Kaiser Permanente provided more than \$1.3 million in charitable contributions to address community health priorities in our Golden Gate service area. Read on for examples of our work.

#### **Supporting community mental health**

Amid a national mental health professional shortage, we invested in expanding a diverse, well-trained, culturally responsive mental health workforce. We also focused on increasing access to mental health services for low-income and vulnerable populations.

In San Francisco, we funded Rafiki Coalition for Health and Wellness to provide culturally responsive and community-based mental health services and healing spaces projected to serve 250 Black residents. In San Rafael, we provided a grant to Center for Domestic Peace to provide bilingual trauma-informed therapy for 90 families who have experienced domestic violence.

### **Improving** conditions for health and equity

Because good health begins where people live, we worked to improve factors affecting health in our communities, such as access to safe, stable housing, and affordable nutritious food.

For example, we provided a grant to San Francisco-Marin Food Bank\* to help low-income Latinx households buy the food they need to stay healthy. Our support helped 1,000 households to enroll or maintain CalFresh (food stamps) benefits with a focus on seniors, children, and LGBTQ+ persons.


### **Strengthening** the health care safety net

We partnered with safety-net hospitals and community health centers to improve care quality for low-income, Medi-Cal, and uninsured patients. Kaiser Permanente clinicians also donated their time and expertise to support these patients.

Our funding of the San Francisco Community Clinic Consortium\* supported advocacy for increasing the pool of diverse behavioral health professionals. It also supported connecting patients throughout its 12-member community health centers to CalFresh (food stamps) and other public benefits. Our Population Health Management Initiative provided funding to Petaluma Health Center\* that will improve clinical quality at its Petaluma and West Marin clinics.
